Selecting a Photograph for Microtheme 6 and Essay 3

Use the following guide to help you find and select an interesting and analysis-worthy photograph for our last two assignments. Though you will only write about one photograph in these assignments, you should initially find at least two or three potential photos. Use our analytical tools and freewriting to select the photograph with the most potential to generate an interesting, original, and non-obvious thesis.

Microtheme 6 Photograph Criteria

To qualify as analysis-worthy and to ensure that it receives full credit on Microtheme 6, the photograph you choose for this assignment (and that you will analyze in Essay 3) must meet **both** of the following criteria. Place a check in the line next to each analytical and formal feature as you find them.

1.	. It must feature at least two of the following ANALYTICAL features:	
	a.	A significant Repetition
	b.	A significant STRAND
	c.	A significant BINARY or STRUCTURING OPPOSITION
	d.	A significant Anomaly
	e.	A significant Assumption (either cultural or authorial)
	f.	A significant IMPLICIT BELIEF or CLAIM
2.	It must contain at least three of the following FORMAL features:	
	a.	A significant Vector
	b.	A significant FOCAL POINT
	c.	Significant use of COLOR, CONTRAST , or LIGHTING
	d.	A significant Perspective (camera angle)
	e.	Significant use of SOCIAL DISTANCE
	f.	Significant use of BALANCE , NEGATIVE/POSITIVE SPACE , or LAYOUT
	g.	Significant use of FRAMING
	r	N.B.: A detail is significant only if it is one that you can use to make a

N.B.: A detail is **significant** only if it is one that you can use to make a meaningful, non-obvious claim about how the photograph is representing an issue.
